Ten years and counting

This issue marks ten years of Cedar Mill News! We published the first issue in January 2003. It was an experiment to raise awareness about the Cedar Mill Business Association. A small group of CMBA members sat around a table at a local restaurant, discussing why we attended meetings. It all boiled down to gossip! We wanted to know what was going on in the community. So we decided to try a newsletter.

The first issue was one single page, and was intended for distribution among the local businesses. It soon became clear that we had a broader audience and the paper expanded. Pacific Office Automa-

tion agreed to let us print it for free on their high-speed copiers. The CMBA sponsored the publication for the first years.

The Cornell Road project was just getting underway. And then along came Beaverton's annexation push, and then the Walmart



base was growing. We were printing 600 copies for distribution around the community, but another 800-900 people were getting it via an email link to web pages or a PDF file.

In February 2011, The Cedar Mill News became independent from the Cedar Mill Business Association. This allowed us to cover non-member businesses and we discontinued the member discount on advertising.

Today, we're up to nearly 1800 online subscribers, so with the 600 paper copies that are distributed each month, we reach a good portion of the 5412 households listed in the 2010 census. We're gratified that in this age of media consolidation and shrinkage, the community and businesses choose to support this "hyper-local" outlet for community news. We still find folks who haven't heard about us yet, so if you like The News, tell your friends!

Pedestrian projects proposed

The Urban Road Maintenance District provides enhanced maintenance to the roads and streets of the large urban unincorporated areas of Washington County. A few years ago, a citizen advisory committee was formed to provide input on how from Cedar Hills Boulevard to our tax money should best be used to provide for our transportation needs. URMDAC recommended, and the Washington County Board of Commissioners approved, a proposal to slightly reduce the standards for road surface maintenance, and use the savings to provide much-needed pedestrian and bike facilities to urban-area streets.

The committee has been working on a list of recommended safety improvement projects for the coming years, and several of them are in our area. This list will go to the Commissioners for approval, and may be trimmed or amended, but it's likely that most of it will pass.

McDaniel Road: a pedestrian path from Harding Court to near Arnott Lane. The path will serve residents and Bonny Slope School students. Because of some segments that will be required to be built by new developments, this project will only cost about \$159,000.

Leahy Road: from 8310 NW Leahy to near West TV Elementary,

a pedestrian path to serve students and residents. Combining with the Safe Routes to School-funded work brings this project in at around \$114,000.

Butner Road: a pedestrian path Murray. Residents will enjoy a safer way to get around, and improved access to the popular Commonwealth Lake Park. Because of rightof-way acquisition, and the longer span, the price for this project will be around \$563,000.

Laidlaw Road: a pedestrian path from one mile east of Lakeview Drive to 140th Avenue. Students of Stoller Middle School and Jacob Wismer Elementary will enjoy safer access. Again, ROW costs and terrain will bring the cost to around \$453,000.

Projects that were approved last year and scheduled for construction this spring include a pedestrian path on the north side of NW Rainmont between NW 111th and NW 113th, and along the west side of NW 111th between NW Rainmont and McDaniel Road.



Eating like a Bird

This common phrase generally means to pick at one's food—rather like some typical backyard birds that appear to be picking around a lot but not eating much. I personally have never seen an obese Song Sparrow or Robin. However birds eat a LOT. Even a short time watching outdoors will allow you to see how much time almost all species of birds spend eating. They tend to eat things that most humans would not enjoy, such as worms, snails, snakes, rotten fruit, berries that look past their prime, and seeds.

I had the good fortune to spend a recent dark and gloomy rainy day recovering from too much work, so I sat and knitted, drank tea, watched the day unfold out my window, and rested. I also noticed several things about how my Cedar Mill backyard birds were eating that I have not thought about before.

Outside my window we have a collection of bird feeders. We also deliberately plant foods in the garden known to be attractive to birds, such as crab apple trees and bushes loaded with berries. We leave some leaves on the ground as cover for insects. We do not use pesticides, allowing the aphids to flourish on the roses so that the Chickadees can "act like a vacuum" going up and down the stems scooping up protein. I noticed a particular pair of Red Breasted Nuthatches going to the seed feeder and then taking their sunflower seed treat up to a specific branch. They lodged the seed into a crack where they then could hit it repetitively with their beaks to break it open to enjoy. Over and over to the same branch they went.

I also noted the Red Tailed Hawks, which I generally see feeding on rodents and snakes, swoop down and snatch up an unobservant Junco from the ground. I am used to seeing Coopers and Sharp Shinned Hawks eat other birds but had never seen the Red Tailed eat a bird. I think that, since the wetlands were so flooded with large amounts of recent rainfall, the typical prey wasn't available so this bird switched to what was around to eat.

The most vigorous eater of the day was by far the Varied Thrush. This is a winter bird for us since they breed in Alaska and northern Canada. This bird loves to throw leaves around looking for insects hiding underneath. I often guessed that this bird was about to appear by the quantity of leaves being thrown from behind a bush.

The vote for "most adorable" went to the huge flock of Bushtits. These tiny birds with long tails flock up in the winter to feed and perch together. In the spring they pair up to build nests. The flock at our feeder had at least fifty tiny birds eating our suet. Such small beaks

but such large bites of suet! They must need a lot of food to keep warm. They visited the feeder so many times that by the end of the day the entire suet block was gone. Now other birds did help eat the suet including Yellow Rumped Warblers, Black Capped Chickadees, and Downy Woodpeckers. Northern Flickers, one Ruby

Crowned Kinglet, and unfortunately some bully Starlings. But most of the eating was done by the Bushtits.

Birds eat in amazingly diverse ways—some eat fruit, others eat snakes. Some eat by themselves and others in social flocks. However the phrase "eating like a bird" does not seem to hold up to scrutiny of real bird behavior—most eat a lot and often, and very few are inflexible about what to eat. The major difference appears to be that birds don't eat for "non food" reasons like humans do. We eat to be comforted, to signal our status, or to have contact in addition to our need for nutrition. So maybe we should "eat like birds" –in some ways at least. 




