Community Club raising funds to replant trees

We were all shocked and saddened when we saw the devastation to our beautiful, forested parks, in addition to the damage to peoples' homes and yards. Tualatin Hills



The trail through the woods was impassable until the THPRD crew came to clear it.

Park & Recreation Department (THPRD) crews worked hard to remove hazard trees and clear trails like the one in the Bluffs Park leading to Bonny Slope Elementary.

One of our neighbors on the nearly 5000-member <u>Facebook</u> Cedar Mill News Group suggested that we might want to help THPRD in the replanting effort that will take place this fall.

We reached out to the district to make sure we could do this and were given a go-ahead. Funds can be deposited to the Cedar Mill Community Club (CMCC) account

at Sunset Credit Union, or you can donate online with our GoFundMe project. Funds will be held until plans are in place for renovating the natural areas.

By fall, THPRD will have replanting plans ready to go for the optimal planting season. Their Nature & Trails division can provide direction for volunteer and community service projects for trail stewardship, and restoration of natural areas. CMCC will continue to work with them until fall. We'll keep everyone updated on progress and plans.

Roads & Transit

Highway 217 closure mid-March

OR 99W to Greenburg Road: Saturday, March 9, 11 pm-Sunday, March 10, 8 am; Friday, March 15, 9 pm-Monday, March 1,8 5 am

As part of the Hall Boulevard overpass closure Highway 217 will



close in both directions in Tigard for one night on March 9 and one weekend March 15-18. Several on-ramps leading up to the closure area will also close during this time. Project neighbors should expect daytime and nighttime construction noise during these times.

Hall Boulevard nine-month closure



Kenny/Thompson update

Washington County Land Use and Transportation (LUT) has had a realignment on the books for Thompson Road, between Saltzman and the north end of the Hartung. Farms subdivision, for a long time. The alignment of NW Kenny Terrace in the Willow Creek development

was determined with the expectation of an eventual connection.

After discussions with the neighbors, in the form of virtual and inperson Open Houses, the final design was



A big point of contention for many neighbors was the removal of the street trees, planted 20 years ago when Willow Creek subdivision was built. The sidewalks along the new alignment will be rebuilt and new street trees will be installed. Environmentalists contend that new young trees don't perform the services that old established trees provide (oxygen production, drainage management, shade) but the county now contends that many of the existing trees are in poor shape.

The realignment includes moving westbound traffic onto the Kenny alignment just west of the Saltzman intersection and closing off "Old Thompson" east of the entrance to Findley Elementary. Tustin Ranch Drive will also be closed at Thompson.

Walker Road project traffic impacts

Traffic will switch to the west side of 158th Avenue, north of Walker Road, starting Monday, March 4, with the installation of temporary striping and the removal of concrete barriers.

The outside northbound travel lane on 158th Avenue, north of Walker Road, will reopen, along with pedestrian access. The two southbound travel lanes on 158th will be shifted slightly east to allow a daily, temporary work zone along the west side of 158th Avenue. Pedestrian access will be closed along the west side of 158th Avenue.

Pedestrians should access Fred Meyer and adjacent stores using the Schendel Avenue or Walker Road entrances. Read more about the project here.

Transit Study Findings

LUT is presenting the findings of the Washington County Transit Study to a Work Session of the county Board of Commissioners (BCC) on March 5. The survey for

the study concluded on March 1, so public comments were summarized for the presentation.

LUT and regional partners including TriMet, Ride Connection, Metro, and local cities identified the growing need for more people to utilize public transit in order to meet the region's ambitious climate, equity, and transportation goals. The March 24 2023 Regional Transportation Plan sets an aggressive target to triple the transit mode share for all trips from 4.1% in 2020 to 12.2% by 2045.

"Over the last year, staff has worked closely with our partnering agencies to develop a Transit Vision that builds from and coordinates with other planning efforts to guide of Orenco. Shuttle buses will serve development of transit services across the county over the next 20 years. The county and the cities of Beaverton, Hillsboro, Tigard and Tualatin each contributed funding for the study."

The documentation for the presentation includes key recommendations to deal with the barriers and concerns expressed by the public. Of particular interest to Cedar Mill area residents and businesses is a proposal to expand use of shuttles and community con-

> nectors to additional service areas.

The Vision for Transit also suggests that: Ondemand or community connector services can provide cost-effective shared rides that can help connect people to frequent transit service; Employers beyond the reach of transit can fund a shared

shuttle service from transit centers to help retain and attract employ-

MAX Blue Line disruptions

Construction of TriMet's A Better Red MAX Extension and Reliability Improvements Project is nearing the end of the line in more ways than one. The final planned disruption for the multi-year project will take place along a stretch of the MAX Blue Line in Hillsboro west closed stations between Orenco Station and Hatfield Government Center. This will allow crews to finish signal work in and around the Fair Complex/Hillsboro Airport MAX Station— the new end of the line for MAX Red Line trains beginning this summer. Volunteer to improve Translation Quality

Washington County's Community Language Access Steering Committee is in the process of creating language specific subcommittees to assist with translation. Volunteers will verify translated documents in eleven Safe Harbor languages, making sure they are written in plain language, accurate to meaning, and easy to understand. This current recruitment is for: Korean, Filipino/Tagalog, Khmer/Cambodian, Persian/Farsi, and Somali. Volunteers have already been recruited for other Safe Harbor languages (Spanish, Vietnamese, Chinese, Arabic, Russian, Japanese). If interested however, applications are still being accepted for these language needs.

Ideally participants would be Washington County residents. Translation experience is valued, but not mandatory. Washington

County recognizes the importance of having committee members of varying backgrounds and prioritizes cultural understanding over academic accuracy.

The subcommittees will meet monthly or every other month. Participants will be given a \$100 stipend for each meeting they attend.







It's one of the critical Special Service Districts that make it possible to live comfortably in the large areas of the county that never became part of cities. Safety Improvements Coming to Waterhouse

THPRD is improving trail accessibility across the regional trail system by partnering with Washington County's Urban Road Maintenance District. This project will construct pedestrian crossings with curb ramps along the Waterhouse Trail at NW Brandberry, Laidlaw, Charlais, and Paisley. The construction for these crossings is currently expected to begin in mid to late 2024.

Amphibian Surveys

You may see volunteers wading in the parks—they have started counting clusters of amphibian eggs in ponds and wetlands at nine sites. The information is used to help understand the health of frogs and salamanders in the district's natural areas.

Local Option Levy Update

The Board of Directors has sent a local option levy to voters for the May 2024 election. The levy would maintain existing service levels for parks, trails and recreation programming. Funding for the levy will preserve nearly 50 full-time positions and 235 part-time positions that perform park, trail, and natural area maintenance and lead recreation classes and programs such as art, sports, and aquatics. It is a five-year levy of \$0.50 per \$1,000 in assessed value. If approved, the levy would increase taxes on the average home in the district by about \$152.12 per year, or \$12.68 per month. As a consequence of our storm, I am strongly urging my sellers to start prepping their homes a month or two prior to coming to market. "Slight discoloration is not a cause for concern and can be the result of naturally occurring tannins in the unfiltered source


water we purchase from the Portland Water Bureau. In the fall and winter water can take on a colored tint due to organics in the watershed. More information can be
