Cedar Mill's real estate market: Spring selling season

5000 active home buyers have come into Portland's Spring market since my March report (RMLS lock box statistics). The market gains momentum every year as we move closer to the end of the colder months, and our local real estate market begins to shift to favor sellers as more buyers start actively searching for homes.

Home inventory has dropped further, and prices have begun to rise more steadily as the competition tightens. Conditions are right for sellers to benefit from these factors that will likely only improve as we head further into Spring.

Buyer traffic is one of the most important indicators of the state of the housing market. In February and March a much higher number of active buyers shifted the housing market to lukewarm status. Based on the seasonal cycles of our local market, we should see the number


SW Taylor/SW Salmon partition

Transportation Improvement Projects

Learn more about <u>transportation projects</u> currently in construction or design on this page. Here are some local upcoming projects.

Cornell Road Sidewalk Repair

The sidewalks on Cornell Road from Saltzman to Dale Avenue are damaged. LUT will replace over 3200 square feet of sidewalk panels where needed on both sides of the road. The street trees that were originally planted are not suitable for the roadside environment. Over time, they have damaged the tree grates and surrounding sidewalk. We will remove and replace them with trees from ourdeapproved street tree list.

Because the tree grates were custom built, we cannot replace them. We will fill the tree wells level to the sidewalk with mulch. The mulch will be replaced as needed.

Construction start (expected): May 2024; Construction finish (expected): June 2024. As of March 12, design work is nearing completion. Cost: \$200,000 (estimate) funded by the Road Fund. For more information, contact Road Maintenance, lutops@washingtoncountyor.gov or 503-846-7623.

Thompson Road Realignment (Kenny Terrace)

Thompson Road has two sharp curves west of Saltzman. LUT will connect Thompson Road to Kenny Terrace west of Saltzman Road and north of Hartford Lane. This creates a new road alignment that avoids the curves. The new alignment has three vehicle lane. We will install buffered bike lanes and multiuse (bike and pedestrian) paths on both sides of the road.

Many of the existing trees along Kenny Terrace have outgrown the space and are unhealthy. Trees are being removed due to poor condition and to accommodate the multiuse paths. We will plant more trees throughout the area than we remove. Tree species are being selected for suitability to the landscape area provided. We will also improve stormwater drainage and street lighting.

The bid opening is scheduled for Wednesday, April 3. The bid opening date was pushed back two weeks 2024-25 Road Maintenance Program online

because the project manager was promoted, and a new project manager stepped in and needed to get up to speed, according to an LUT spokesperson. Construction start (expected): May 2024; Construction finish (expected): Summer 2025

Walker Road construction drives on

Work continues on Walker Road, with two more projects moving toward construction.

Walker Road Phase 2 (Schendel Avenue to Butner Road) is in construction through December.

Walker Road Phase 3 (173rd Avenue to 185th Avenue) is expected to start

construction this fall and continue through late 2026.

Walker Road and Murray
Boulevard Intersection Project is
expected to start construction in
summer 2025 and continue through
summer 2027.

Ordinance 900: Amending the TSP

Tuesday, April 2, 10:25 am, online and Charles D. Cameron Public Services Building, Auditorium, 155 N. First Ave., Hillsboro

The first public hearing for Ordinance 900 will take place early this month, followed by a vote for passage. Ordinance No. 900 (link to download a PDF, see the maps section for more info) proposes to amend the Transportation System

Plan (TSP) to incorporate general map and text changes for consistency with ongoing transportation planning efforts. Many of the amendments are proposed for consistency with transportation plan updates adopted by cities. The amendments also establish the alignment of the Council Creek Regional Trail and include changes to the transit system map for consistency with recent transit service provider plans. The proposed ordinance is posted on the County's land use ordinance webpage here.

Maps that affect our area are on page 2, 20, 25 (bus lines); page 33-34 (Community Connection Areas) and page 35 (Pedestrian System Classifications from regional trail to trail refinement areas). The video of the meeting is available to view on the "Recent Meetings" tab on the right side of this page.

Trimet is moving ahead on A Better Red

If you have missed being able to use the MAX Red Line to get to and from the airport, here's some good news. We're now through the last planned service disruptions needed for the project. The <u>Gateway North MAX Station</u> officially opened March 4. This station serves MAX Red Line trains heading from Portland International Airport toward City Center.

We wrapped up the last disruption of the project just days ago as our focus turned to the west side and extending the MAX Red Line 10 stations west. When A Better Red is complete later this summer, the Red Line will run between Hillsboro and Portland's airport stations. That means faster and more convenient travel for riders and a better-connected west side.

Legislative News

We asked a couple of our Oregon State Legislature representatives to offer their thoughts on the recently ended 2024 "Short Session" that began on February 5, and ended on March 7, and specifically what affects us in Cedar Mill.

From Lisa Reynolds, House District 34

(our current State Representative) I couldn't be prouder of my

colleagues and our staff for tackling some of the most difficult challenges in our state this session.

We focused on substance use treatment and prevention by addressing Measure 110. Close

to home, the legislature allocated almost \$9 million going to the Washington County Behavioral Health Division to support the development of the Center for Addictions Triage and Treatment project. This ambitious and comprehensive center for those struggling with addiction is already being lauded as a blueprint for other communities. And it's in House District 34! (HB 5204)

The legislature also funded upstream interventions such as Nurse-Family Partnership (my personal bill) and Relief Nurseries. These are both programs for families with babies and toddlers, offering support and connection to resources and services. The fact that these programs are viewed as part of our addiction prevention strategy shows that the culture is changing, and folks are listening – we cannot treat ourselves out of the addiction crisis, we must focus on prevention. And the earlier, the better.

All of these projects were part of a total package of about \$211 million for addiction treatment and prevention statewide—a historic step forward!

In addition to combatting addiction, the legislature passed many other impactful bills this session. We continued our efforts on housing and homelessness, with \$379 million going to prevent and solve homelessness and to build affordable housing stock. We also passed campaign finance reform (HB 4024)! Soon, campaign contributions will be limited to \$3,300 for organizations and private citizens to prevent the outsized influence of wealthy individuals.

Another important bill (SB 1576) ensured that public and private landowners are not liable for injuries sustained while recreating. This bill will make sure that Oregon's glorious parks and trails stay open to the public – and was a personal favorite of mine!

Lastly, for all those Sunset High School families out there—the legislature unanimously passed my bill

about International Baccalaureate Diploma Reciprocity. This bill says that if students complete the requirements of their IB program, they will have met the requirements for an Oregon High School diploma. Removing these scheduling barriers will increase equity and accessibility to the IB diploma program. Full disclosure: the Oregon

Department of Education and local school districts can tinker with this a little bit.

As we barrel towards 2025, I'm following Washington County's ban on flavored tobacco closely. I plan to revive my bill banning flavored tobacco across the state in 2025, along with introducing a major bill package to support maternal and early childhood health. Stay tuned!

From Maxine Dexter, House District 33

(formerly our rep before the boundaries were changed, now running for US House in east Multnomah County) "In just a few short weeks, the legislature was able to pass huge accomplishments for Oregonians that will be felt in every corner of our state. Some of the biggest investments were in housing, behavioral health, and public safety. I was proud to champion the housing package which invested a historic \$376



production. These dollars will be coming to Washington County soon to address the urgent needs we are seeing in our communities."

Her Outreach Coordinator, Mie Kumin, provided this summary.

Rep. Dexter is most proud of the historic housing package that she championed and led which invested a historic \$376 million into housing production, home ownership, public infrastructure, shelters, and rental assistance. HB 1530, a key piece of legislation in the housing package, makes significant investments into recovery housing including \$1,555,274 to Bridges to Change for down payment and operational support for Washington County scattered housing sites. \$750,000 to Free on the Outside to support the purchase of a home in Washington County serving justice involved individuals, and \$1,020,000 to Transcending Hope (Familias Transcendiendo) for down payment and operational Support in Washington County.

In addition to the housing package, the legislature passed HB 4002 and HB 5204, which include substantial investments into our behavioral health system and public safety. HB 5204 allocates \$8,900,000 to Washington County Behavioral Health Division to support the development of the Center for Addictions Triage and Treatment project in Beaverton and Hillsboro. Additionally, \$9.7 million was allocated to stabilize and expand treatment courts by providing permanent funding for treatment court coordinator positions that are currently funded through Oregon Criminal Justice Commission grants.



The CATT Center finally has the funds to move forward thanks to the 2024 legislature.


This funding will stabilize specialty court coordinator positions in many counties including Washington County. HB 4002 will provide \$20.7 million in grants to counties and tribal governments to fund deflection programs. The bill includes direct allocations for 23 counties that have indicated they intend to implement a deflection program, including Washington County.

While there are many more bills that were passed that will impact all Oregonians, these packages represent the largest investments and Rep. Dexter looks forward to seeing the positive results from this funding in Washington County.

THPRD News Local Levy Option Update

A five-year levy of \$0.50 per \$1,000 in assessed value for Tualatin Hills Park & Recreation District (THPRD) will appear on your May ballot. If approved, it would increase taxes on the average home in the district by about \$152.12 per year, or \$12.68 per month, and ensure several things. First, weekly garbage collection at parks would not be reduced to monthly or twice a month at some parks. Second, public restrooms will stay open and clean without a reduction in cleaning service from multiple times a week to once a week or less. Third, this ensures after school and preschool programming continues at THPRD. Fourth, the levy continues the existing maintenance service and recreation programming levels. This includes funding for nearly 50 full-time positions and 200 parttime positions that perform park, trail, and natural area maintenance and lead recreation classes and programs such as art, sports, and aquatics. Fifth, the funds will keep pools and splash pads open. Without a levy, the district will have to close some facilities, including three swimming pools and two splash pads. design, operations, and maintenance," THPRD's board of directors adopted the district's first climate action plan in March.

Actions in the mitigation section will help THPRD reduce the amount of greenhouse gases emitted, thereby helping to slow or stop the effects of climate change. Key actions include reducing building energy usage; using less water; and updating the

district's purchasing policy

Actions in the adaptation section will help people and parks to thrive and be more comfortable in the face of extreme weather, such as hotter, drier summers. The district's approach includes developing and implementing guidelines to create climate-adapted parks and facilities; supporting the community by participating in the Natural Hazard Mitigation Program; and stewarding parks and natural areas to be resilient and minimizing wildfire risks

The plan will be carried out over a five-year period and aligns with the Oregon Global Warming Commission's climate action goals to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 95% by 2050. Read the full plan here.

Portland State University, ODFW
mapped out statewide wildlife
habitat connectivity at detailed
resolutions for 54 species. Smart
development such as roadway overpasses and underpasses can help
maintain critical wildlife movement. An underpass for frogs is
being constructed on Hwy 30!

The beaver is our state animal due to the large population of beavers at the time of colonization. Industrial-scale trapping decimated the population in the late 1800's. Now, ODFW has formed the Beaver Works Oregon to improve communication and information on the competing benefits and costs of beaver management in the state, working to improve understanding of beaver ecology and management. HB 3464, signed into law on January 1, 2024, moves the management of beavers from the Oregon Department of Agriculture to ODFW, where they will be tasked with adopting rules relating to beaver management (extermination and trapping) on private lands as well as tracking populations as a whole.

Westside Multimodal Improvements Study (WMIS)

Stephanie Millar of the Oregon Dept of Transportation (ODOT) and Kate Hawkins of Metro described the **WMIS**. They were joined by Don Odermott, a member of the WMIS Steering Committee and a local transportation expert. The study analyzed over 80 transportation projects, policies, and programs that could help improve existing and future transportation deficiencies in the westside corridor. With the county's burgeoning population, it is crucial to design an efficient system that will serve the area for decades to come. Mr. Odermott discussed the completed Washington County Transportation Futures Study which informed the work of the WSIS. Many transportation projects are de-

The WMIS examined four enhancement scenarios from minor improvements in Scenario 1 to major large-scale infrastructure improvements in Scenario 4. The recommendations coming from the study are being reviewed by the WMIS Steering Committee which defer the large-scale projects in Scenario 4 to a future date. We will share these recommendations with CPO 1 when they are approved.

TVF&R asks voters to approve a local option levy for earner le

Voters will decide in the May 21 election whether to support Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue's (TVF&R) local option levy to maintain fire and emergency medical response services and personnel hired since 2000.

Measure 34-332 proposes a replacement five-year operating levy with a rate of 69 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. For a property assessed at \$305,000, about the average in TVF&R's service area, the cost of the local option levy would be about \$210 per year or \$17.54 a month. TVF&R's existing levy, which was approved in 2019, will not sustain current or future fire and emergency medical service operations and is set to expire in June 2025. Under Oregon law, levies expire in five years or less and require voter approval.

If the replacement levy passes, levy funds will retain existing first responders and add 36 more. Additional responders at existing stations will ensure prompt response times and reliability when multiple incidents happen at the same time.

If approved, the replacement levy would appear on the November 2025 property tax statement. This measure may cause property taxes to increase by more than 3%. TVF&R intends to maintain the same levy rate for 10 years, which will help long-term planning, ensure service stability, and provide predictability to taxpayers. 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

portions of the <u>County's Comprehensive Plan</u>. The PC also makes final land use decisions for some plan amendments. PC decisions may be appealed to the Board.

PC members must reside in Washington County. Generally, two members are appointed by each Board Commissioner, and one by the Board Chair as an at-large appointment. No more than two members can be engaged principally in the buying, selling or development of real estate, and the PC already has two, Mike Frey (District 2) and Jared Whipps (District 3). No more than two members can be engaged in the same occupation, and at this time there are no members engaged in the same occupation. Some knowledge of the Oregon land use planning system is helpful.

WashCo Senior Planner Todd Borkowitz, Land Use & Transportation (LUT) staff liaison to the PC, says, "While a board commissioner typically recommends a potential PC appointee from their district, they can also recommend someone residing elsewhere in the County. The Board has made out-of-district appointments in the recent past, including PC member Jared Whipps who the Board appointed earlier this year."





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
