Road News

Thompson Road realignment update

Meet the Contractor/Open House Tuesday, June 4, 5-7 pm, Cedar Mill Library meeting room, 1080 NW Saltzman

Meet the project team and learn about construction to realign Thompson Road with Kenney Terrace. Construction starts this summer. No presentation is planned. Drop in anytime between 5-7 pm.

The Project Page has been updated to show an expected construction start date of June 2024. We will find out more about the sequence of demolition and construction phases at the Open House, we assume.

be extensive, long and complicated detours will be necessary. We found this information in a report on the project: "To facilitate the realignment of Thompson Road, two road closures will be necessary. The first closure will be 75 calendar days to make the connection to the new alignment on the west end of the project [where "Old" Thompson makes a 90° turn to become West Union]. The second closure will be 30 calendar days to make the connection of the new alignment to the Thompson Road/Saltzman Road Intersection. Pedestrian routes will be maintained during the closures. A vehicular detour route will be posted directing vehicles and bicycles to use West Union Road,

Will the median at (Old) Thompson Road and 135th Avenue be removed to allow left turns?

A median is required by our design standards. The 40-mph speed limit requires more sight distance than exists to allow safe left turns. The speed limit would need to be reduced to 25 mph before left turns can be considered. The median will not be removed as a part of this project. The median is required for safety due to limited sight distance around the curve.

The Opal Apartments bring diversity and affordability to downtown Cedar Mill

On April 11, we gathered at the newest building in Cedar Mill to celebrate The Opal, at the corner of Dogwood and Saltzman, opposite the library. County officials, employees from Friendly House, Christ United Methodist Church (CUMC) members and leaders, and people from around the community joined prospective tenants in celebrating the beautiful new five-story apartment building. We toured apartments and heard comments from representatives of the organizations that made it possible, including Pam Treece, our County Commissioner, and Juan Carlos Gonzalez, our Metro Councilor.

This new apartment community will provide 54 affordable homes for older adults, with an emphasis on serving LGBTQ+ residents with limited incomes. Construction was funded in part with over \$6 million in Metro affordable housing bond funds-about a quarter of the project's total costs. Redstone Equity Partners and Beneficial State Bank were finance partners.



It dedicates half its units to serving extremely low-income residents, with income at 30% or less of the Area Median Income (AMI), by utilizing 24 project-based vouchers for rental assistance. The remaining half will serve very-low-income residents, earning less than 60% of AMI.

CPO 1 May meeting: TriMet and Peterkort update

Tuesday, May 14, 7-9 pm, hybrid via zoom and at Cedar Grove East Community Room, 13400 NW

CPO 1 will feature a TriMet update covering these topics: "What is a Hop Card, how do you get one, and how is it used? What kind of shuttle services are recommended in the Westside Multimodal Improvements **Study?** How is Ride Connection related to TriMet?"And we will have a general update on the projects and services provided by TriMet.

A representative of David Evans & Associates has been invited to share an update on some design changes for West Village Phase I project (formerly Sunset Town Center Phase 1), the mixed-use project proposed for the land north of the Sunset Transit Center. This was not confirmed at press time but the program will be updated on the CPO 1 Facebook page.

You now have the choice of meeting online via zoom, or in person in the East Community Room at Cedar Grove Apartments at the corner of Murray and Cornell. If you are driving, please either park on the street or in the southeast corner of the Safeway lot. If you can't attend the meeting, it is recorded and available on YouTube for viewing later. Visit our You-Tube channel and subscribe! Our Facebook Group is a good place to discuss current issues and get timely updates.

CPO 7 meeting

Monday, May 13, 7 pm, Bethany Presbyterian Church, 15505 NW Springville Road, and <u>live-streamed</u> on Facebook

CPO7 will host the Washington County Sheriff's Office and Washington County Land Use & Transportation. Presentations will address how traffic safety concerns are assessed and addressed by Washington County and how Washington County partners with other jurisdictions to mitigate problems.

Partnering with other jurisdictions has become an issue in our neighborhood because the north section of one neighborhood street (150th Ave.) is in Unincorporated Washington County while the south end of the street (where it connects with Walker Road) is in the City of Beaverton. Additionally,

some neighbors living on 150th Ave (north of Walker Road) are in CPO1 while others (those living north of NW Pioneer Ave.) are in CPO7. We, and LUT, think this is a topic that would be of interest to CPO1 members and we would like to invite you all to our May 13 meeting. This will again be an inperson meeting with the option of accessing the live stream format.

Development News Lakeshore pond dredging

An application was submitted to Washington County Land Use and Transportation (LUT) by the Lakeshore HOA to dredge the three ponds due to accumulated sediment, and to enhance the wetland and vegetated corridors. Comments are due by May 7. Visit this page and select L2400042.

Cedar Hills Apartments granted a two-year extension

High Street Residential requested that Beaverton grant an extension of the approval for their project to redevelop the existing Cedar Hills Shopping Center into 4,700 sf. of ground floor commercial space, and 400 attached dwelling units. No changes to the design of the previously approved decision are proposed.

Park Place Homes LLC development approved

Two two-parcel partitions were approved for lots on the west side of NW 113th Ave, north of NW Damascus. Conditions included building a sidewalk and a halfstreet improvement for 113th.

Cedar Mill Terrace development application submitted

An 8-lot subdivision is proposed for a 1.75-acre site on NW Kearney east of 116th. Right-of-way will be dedicated along the property's south boundary along Kearney to

allow for a full-width street connection between NW 113th and NW 116th. Another **ROW**



at the northeast corner will allow for a full-width connection of NW 114th and NW Kenzie. A pedestrian path is proposed to connect NW Kenzie

and NW Kearney along the east side of the development.

Westlake Consultants submitted the application for Noyes Development who plan to build the subdivision. The area is zoned R-6 (six lots per acre) as are the adjacent properties. This application is for the land division. Another application will be submitted before construction begins. The application packet will be available to view at the CPO 1 area of the Cedar Mill Library. CPO 1 comments are due by May 17. If you want CPO 1 to comment, send an email to cpolleaders@gmail.com.

April meeting notes

By Bruce Bartlett, CPO 1 Vice Chair Every month, CPO 1 starts our land use-oriented meeting by reading the county's Land Acknowledgment statement, in part to remind us of our stewardship responsibilities. A recording of the meeting can be found here. During the "It's Your CPO" segment, a statement from Stacey Wainwright, who was unable to attend, was read regarding Thompson Road east of Saltzman and how the lack of sight distance makes it very unsafe for everyone.

Pam Treece, District 2 County Commissioner shared that May is the time to establish the county budget and there are many moving pieces. Further budget cuts are predicted in the 4% range. Public comments will be accepted during the review period. She reported that Portland General Electric donated \$10,000 to the Washington County Cooperative Library System (WC-CLS) related to the impact of the January 17 ice storms. The money is earmarked for E-books for young people. The Oregon Legislature approved approximately \$13M for the new Center for Addictions Triage and Treatment (CATT), a project to

increase addictions treatment capacity in Washington County on schedule to open in 2025. That money will allow construction to begin.

Service Provider Updates

Roads, continued from page 1 sures will be scheduled so there will be open access to/from the TVF&R station. The project includes two separate road closures, each will last about 30 days. {Ed. Note, this conflicts with the above detour info, we don't know which is correct.]

How will the new Thompson Road alignment impact student drop-off and pickup at Findley Elementary?

Findley Elementary student drop-off and pickup has been considered in the design of the project. We will coordinate with school staff cifically to the Westsside Interagency throughout construction to maintain access with minimal delays.

What traffic control will be used at Kenny Terrace/Thompson Road and Old Thompson Road?

A stop sign will be installed on existing Thompson Road (Old Thompson Road) where it intersects for the Search and Rescue (SAR) Kenny Terrace (new Thompson Road). There will be a clear line of sight in both directions.

How does this project impact the access to Arbor Cascadian neighborhood?

The existing Thompson Road will dead end at the Findley Elementary driveway. Access to the Cascadian neighborhood at 135th will remain right-in and right-out [from Old Thompson?]. Evergreen Street access will remain open throughout construction.

We assume that these detours and impacts will vary throughout the project, which is estimated to last through summer 2025. LUT tells us, "Actual construction work, including road closures, will start in June. We will work closely with TVF&R to ensure they have advanced knowledge of all traffic impacts and the resources they need to avoid the closures. We are still completing hiring paperwork with the contractor; we do not have a schedule from the contractor and do not have expected dates for the two road closures. We expect to have these in late May."

K9, continued from page 1 therefore more dangerous...staff in the Washington County Jail have been managing more and more frequent overdoeses and drug seizures...They currently have one narcotic detection dog on the K9 team, but that dog is dedicated to the patrol division and even more spe-



Narcotics Team...The requested funds will cover the cost of a pretrained narcotic detection dog, to include familiarization training by the vendor for the new handler."

Currently the Foundation is raising money to buy a new van Team. The team has 50-60 Cadets, ranging in ages from 14-21, and 14 Washington County Sheriff's Office Deputies. The SAR team responds to local and state-wide searches. rescues, and evidence-searches. The current 25-year-old 15-passenger van needs replacing. 

Rev. Items the levy would fund include ensuring weekly garbage collection at parks, ensuring public restrooms stay open and cleaned, preserve up to 300 positions (50 full-time and 250 part-time), fund after school and preschool programs, and maintain facility hours for the public at recreation centers. Safeguarding Drinking Water Quality through Service Line Identification to visually identify the material type

Tualatin Valley Water District (TVWD) recently completed an assessment identifying any lead-based service line materials within our public infrastructure. Service lines are the smaller pipes that connect water distribution mains to individual home's water meters and then to a home or business's plumbing. Lead, which is harmful to humans and animals, can be leached into drinking water when a reaction occurs in plumbing materials that contain lead.

Our Service Line Inventory project is required by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) and Oregon Health Authority (OHA) and aligns with TVWD's ongoing commitment to upholding the highest standards of water quality and safety for our customers. Fortunately for TVWD and the much of the Pacific Northwest, lead was rarely—if ever—used for service lines.

During this project, no lead service lines were discovered on either the public or private side of the water system.

These service lines have two components: Public side of Service Line: The portion that connects the water main to a water meter, which is owned and the responsibility of TVWD, and Private side of Service Line: The portion that connects the water meter to a home or business, which is owned and the responsibility of the property owner.

TVWD used a statistical method approved by OHA to randomly select more than 380 residential homes built before 1985, when lead was banned as a building material, from across our service area, including approximately 75 in Cedar Hills and Cedar Mill.

Selecting sites randomly eliminates bias in the process, thereby allowing the results to be applied to the rest of TVWD's service lines with high confidence. This approach saves significant resources for TVWD and its customers when the chances of finding a lead service line on either the public or private side are near zero. Homes built at various dates before 1985 were selected. TVWD never used lead as a material for service lines even before it was banned.

A contractor was hired to excavate and expose a portion of the public and private side service lines to visually identify the material type. The contractor finished this work at the end of March, ahead of schedule and under budget. Complete results will be submitted to OHA in April, ahead of the October 2024 deadline.

TVWD will continue doing everything possible to reduce lead exposure in customer home plumbing, including conducting lead-in-water related outreach and education to customers; tracking, monitoring, and adhering to future water quality rules; and actively participating in an annual lead testing program under the U.S. EPA and OHA lead rules.

We would like to thank the nearly 75 TVWD customers located in the Cedar Hills and Cedar Mill areas who were selected to participate in this project. Their patience during this important project was appreciated by us and our contractor.

Election forum

Harry Bodine Jr. (1932-2024)

April 21, 2024 in Portland. He was born Sept. 12, 1932 in Houston, TX,

the son of Harry He was raised in Dallas, TX and Glendale, MO. Following Kirkwood, MO High School, he obtained a Bachelor of Journalism from Missouri. Following graduation, he served

two years in the U.S. Army's Field Artillery, based in Fort Sill, OK, Fort Riley, KS and Aschaffenburg,

Harry began a 42-year career as a newspaper reporter and editor in 1956 starting at the Roseburg OR News-Review. He later edited the Ontario, OR Argus Observer and returned to Roseburg as city editor. His longest day in the news business came in 1959 when a truck Harry its Distinguished Service loaded with dynamite and fertilizer exploded in downtown Roseburg, killing 14 people and leveling 10 city blocks.

In 1964, Harry left newspaper-

teering at the Cedar Mill library.

At The Oregonian, Harry had his dream job covering state and national politics from 1967 to 1975, interviewing five U.S. Presidents,

> candidates who canvassed Oregon in Presidential primaries, and attending national governors' conferences. In his last decade at The Oregonian, he covered local governments in Washington County.

In retirement, Harry served

on the board of the Cedar Mill Community Library Association and was board president when the library added the addition in 2000-01. From 2002-2020 he was part of the leadership of People for Libraries, advocating voter approval of county-wide property tax levies to finance library services. The record: 5 wins, 1 loss.

Washington County awarded Award in 1986, the first individual so honored, and the Oregon Library Association's Volunteer of the Year award for his work on library levy campaigns in Washington County.

Harry and Winona had two sons. He is survived by their son. Stephen (Steve), his wife Melissa Ann Fischer (Mitzi) and one granddaughter, U.S. Air Force 2nd. Lt. Windra Bodine. A Celebration of Life for both Harry and Winona, who passed away on February 28, 2023, will be held on May 4 at 11 am at Murray Hills Christian Church.
