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Development News Life Time Fitness at Barnes & CHB

With construction finally underway on the Life Time Fitness complex west of Cedar Hills Blvd. (CHB) south of Barnes Road, we have been receiving questions about this development and future plans for the remaining Peterkort properties in the vicinity. Here's a brief review of the development and a timeline of the Peterkort Master Plan.

The Master Plan

In fall 2004, The Peterkort family corporation (J. Peterkort Co.) unveiled a <u>Master Plan</u> for most of the remaining undeveloped land along both sides of Barnes Road from CHB to the Sunset Transit Center. This area was slated for a mix of commercial—offices and

Hopefully the Japanese beetle problem will be under control after five years of treatment by the <u>Oregon Department of Agriculture</u>. Next year we may be able to share plants from our gardens.

We can help now and in the

future to control damaging insects by planting pollinating plants that attract beneficial insects like the Tachinid fly. The <u>Tachinidae</u> family is the largest and most important group of parasitic flies in North America—there are

Defending and improving postal service

> The 2020 election was proof that voting by mail is safe and efficient. We here in Oregon just sailed through—mailing our ballots in, as usual, with no lies about voting fraud. A recent Pew Research Center survey shows an overwhelming 91 percent of respondents have a favorable view of United States Postal Service (USPS), higher than any other federal agency.

Given the concerted effort that <u>Movement Conservatives</u>

have made to undermine it and all other government programs serving the entire population, it's no surprise that the USPS needs support and upgrading. Reduced first-class mail volume, onerous legislation demanding an absurd pre-funding of retirement benefits, removal of the blue USPS drop boxes, aging delivery vehicles; the list goes on.

Trump-appointed <u>Postmas-</u> ter Louis <u>DeJoy</u> began slashing services and equipment in 2020, alarming many when the blue

don't sting or otherwise bother us and they help to control many destructive insects like sawflies, squash bugs, cutworms, tent caterpillars, stink bugs, and of course Japanese beetles!

It is easy to invite the tachinid fly to go to work for us by planting umbel flowers (umbrella-shaped) such as dill, fennel, carrot, cilantro, coriander and parsley. Except for carrots these are all herbs which, of course, enhance many of our favorite meals. Planted among our vegetables and ornamentals we create diversity that invites beneficial insects and supports important pollinators. Life is easier and gardening more fun when we don't have to fight destructive pests.

boxes began to disappear from street corners, and vital sorting equipment was liquidated and destroyed. (DeJoy was a Republican Party fundraiser, the founder and CEO of a logistics and freight company, and the CEO and then board member and large shareholder of the company that acquired it. DeJoy's company holds contracts with the USPS.)

The question now is: What is needed and how to go about it? There are two efforts in process now. On March 23, 2021, the USPS released its 10-year Plan, "<u>Deliver-</u> <u>ing for America</u>," to "return the organization to financial sustainability and achieve service excellence while maintaining universal six-day mail delivery and expanding seven-day package delivery." A summary and the <u>full text are</u> <u>available at this link</u>.

This requires Congressional support and amazingly, <u>truly biparti-</u> <u>san legislation</u> was introduced in the US Senate to produce the <u>Postal</u> <u>Service Reform Act of 2021</u>—H. R. 3076/S.1720, to make the most significant overhaul of the USPS in years.



CPO 1 June meeting

Tuesday, June 8, 7-9 pm via zoom

As usual, we'll start with an open mic and community briefings by service providers as they are available: Washington County Sheriff's Office (WCSO); Tualatin Hills Park & Recreation District (THPRD); Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue (TVF&R); and Beaverton School District (BSD). The public is welcome to share information about what's happening in the area. **7:30 pm: Clean Water Services**

7:30 pm: Clean water Service

Karen DeBaker & Shannon Huggins, Public Affairs with Clean Water Services (CWS), will join our meeting to describe the significant environmental enhancements in the Tualatin Hills Nature Park to be made while they replace a 40-year-old sewer pipe. This Cedar Mill Creek Sanitary and Regional Stormwater Project began in January 2021 with tree felling and will start construction in mid-June. This two-year project will affect access and use of the trails in the nature park. You can find more information about this project on their website.

They will also share an overview of their organization, including water resource recovery—converting waste to clean water to maintain Tualatin River health, and recover phosphorus (a valuable fertilizer) as a commercial bi-product in the process—as well as information about their budget and other functions 8 pm: Enhanced Sheriff's Patrol District Advisory Committee

District Advisory Committee Law enforcement for Washing-

ton County's Urban Unincorporated Area is provided by the Washington County Sheriff's Department. The Enhanced Sheriff's Patrol District (ESPD) allows provision of this service at urban levels rather than the traditionally lower rural level (1 deputy per 1000 residents rather than .5 deputy) and is funded by a five-year serial levy which will be up for renewal in 2022.

The ESPD Advisory Committee (ESPDAC) advises the Sheriff on items of urban concern. Bruce Bartlett, CPO 1 Vice Chair and this year's Chair of the ESPDAC, will present the variety of subjects the committee addresses.

8:30 pm: United States Postal Service Reform Act

Since 2006, the United States Postal Service (USPS) has been burdened with a unique requirement to pre-fund its retirement program. The proposed Postal Service Reform Act would address this and other serious problems afflicting the USPS which have been created by Movement Conservative efforts to privatize the USPS. Bruce Bartlett will share the features of the bill and provide information on how you can submit testimony on it.

CPO 1 May Meeting summary

By Vicky Siah, CPO 1 Secretary Virginia Bruce opened with an update on the Cedar Mill Cider Festival, which is planning to resume on September 19 at the JQA Young House, after being canceled in 2020 because of the pandemic. This year Tualatin Hills Park & Recreation Department, which sponsors the event, is allowing a hard cider vendor, and Virginia has begun to work with Reverend Nat.

Brian Yourstone from THPRD followed this with an update on the Beaverton Creek Trail that will connect the Westside Trail at THPRD Nature Park to the Cedar Hills Crossing area. A timeline for this project can be found on the THPRD website.

THPRD is offering more summer camps in this summer, and these camps have received a grant from the YMCA, enabling them to provide scholarships to 160 youth. In order to support their summer camps, THPRD is looking to hire part time and seasonal employees.

Corinne Haning, Public Affairs representative for the Washington County Sheriff's Office, discussed mail theft issues. Any suspicious activity regarding theft can be reported to the Sheriff's Office through the non-emergency number, 503-629-0111.

Beaverton School District's representative, Kara Yunck, informed CPO 1 that four school board seats are up for election. These positions will be voted on at-large.

As Senator Elizabeth Steiner-Hayward was late to the CPO 1 meeting, Peter Leonard from the Cedar Mill Community Library began his presentation. Since March, there have been considerable changes in the library's operations. The library is now offering browsing inside Cedar Mill and Bethany locations—they hope to allow inperson programs in the future.

Senator Steiner-Hayward arrived during Leonard's presentation and introduced her policies. Steiner-Hayward supports equity investment to overcome decades of systemic racism, investment in child welfare and education, and public health authority. She wants to continue the work of Mitch Greenlick to make healthcare a right in the Oregon Constitution, and aims for this to reach the ballot in the 2022 election cycle. "Data shows that having healthcare as a right in the Constitution-without actually having to do anything about it—has benefits," said Senator Steiner-Hayward, before fielding questions from attending members. Senator Steiner-Hayward is holding a Town Hall on Tuesday, May 25 at 5:30 PM. Her full presentation can be viewed on the CPO 1 Facebook page.

After Senator Steiner-Hayward concluded, Leonard resumed speaking on the Cedar Mill Library. He encourages patrons to stop the spread of COVID-19 through hand-washing, and the library will require masks for inside browsing. The library has eliminated fines for late books; however, they have not noticed a significant difference in the frequency of late returns.

To conclude the meeting, Fran Warren updated CPO 1 on her conversation with Commissioner Treece, and Bruce Bartlett discussed how Washington County is responding to domestic terrorism.

Help me Home

Please tell me about the Sheriff's Office programs to help people who might tend to wander or get lost and have difficulty returning home.

Help Me Home is a voluntary enrollment program for adults and

children who, should they become lost, would have difficulty communicating vital information about themselves due to a medical condition. Those who

are regis-

tered in this program have their identification photo and pertinent information placed in a database managed by the Sheriff's Office that is available across law enforcement agencies countywide.

If a registrant is found alone by law enforcement and needs help, the deputy or officer can quickly search for a match in the Help Me Home

<u>School News</u> BSD Grade Mark Survey

Beaverton School District collected community opinions on the (F) grade mark over the month of May. They propose to eliminate (F) grades and replace them with a non-credit (I) or (N), which represent "Incomplete" and "No Grade." BSD lists their rationale for removing the (F) mark as:

We believe that letter grades should accurately communicate the evidence of a student's proficiency on the content.

The use of a Failing (F) mark is tied to a student's behavior. We have behavior learning targets which communicate student behavior.

The use of the Incomplete (I) and No Grade (N) marks is more equitable.

The use of the Incomplete (I) and No Grade (N) marks is not credit-bearing.

More students will graduate and be able to pursue post-secondary opportunities.

The results of the community survey and their final decision on the (F) grade mark is projected to be released soon. <u>More information</u> <u>on this topic</u> can be found on the BSD website. database using personal identifiers. The cost to register is \$20 and is good for two years. All information is kept confidential and is only available to law enforcement. **Project Life-**

saver This is a

program available specifically to help locate children or adults who have been diagnosed with autism, Down's Syndrome, Alzheimer's Disease, or other memory-related illnesses, by a certified medical professional, and who are known to wander from the safety of caregivers. Project Lifesaver participants wear a waterproof radio transmitter bracelet that may be worn on the participant's wrist or ankle, remaining on at all times. This transmitter produces a unique radio frequency that trained deputies can track should a caregiver report to 9-1-1 that the Project Lifesaver participant is missing. Updated Face Covering Guidance at THPRD

Indoors:

THPRD requires masks or face coverings to be worn indoors at our facilities, unless:

Individuals are participating in an activity that makes it difficult to do so (i.e. swimming, showering, etc).

The patron is fully vaccinated (2 weeks from last vaccination date) and vaccination status has been verified by THPRD staff using the procedure outlined below.

Individuals who provide proof of vaccination will be permitted to use the indoor facility and participate in programs without a mask or face covering and do not need to maintain physical distancing. THPRD staff must verify proof of vaccination before a person can remove a face covering.

Those who do not wish to show proof of vaccination or who are not vaccinated will be required to wear a mask or face covering and maintain physical distancing in THPRD facilities.

Outdoors:

Effective immediately, face coverings are not required to be worn outdoors on THPRD property. Face coverings are also not required by THPRD to be worn when playing or viewing outdoor sports. However, user groups are authorized to set greater restrictions for their participants. Per state guidance, face coverings are still strongly recommended for unvaccinated or vulnerable populations.



Both the federal legislation and the "Delivering For America" proposal would eliminate the requirement that the USPS pre-fund its health benefits for retirees, initiated under the 2006 law, and would integrate its health care with Medicare, which the senators and the USPS both estimate could save the agency more than \$40 billion over the next decade. In addition, the bill would require that the agency publish easily accessible weekly service data on its website, which would allow customers to search information by street address. ZIP Code, or post office box.

Other benefits include: generating approximately \$24 billion in net revenue from enhanced package delivery services; improving cash flow to allow for investment of \$40 billion Hartmeier-Prigg by 10.48%. In in workforce, new vehicles (including electric vehicles), improved Post Offices, technology improvements, and infrastructure upgrades; stabilizing the workforce with a goal of cutting non-career employee turnover in half, and creating more opportunity for growth including more predictable progression into career workforce; aligning pricing to reflect market dynamics; and more.

While there is much in the proposed legislation to recommend it, there is no reason for Section 208 to be included which will delay delivery of first-class mail. "Deliver- PCC, Director Zone 5 ing For America" also recommends that some smaller, lower-volume Post Offices be closed, impacting the integrity of rural communities. We feel Congress should not be facilitating Postmaster General DeJoy's efforts to slow down the mail (see discussion of the "Middle Mile" in the Save the Post Office report below).

The organization, Save The Post Office, has compiled an analysis of the proposal with substantial detail here. Fortunately, you can provide your comments to the Postal Regulatory Commission (PRC), which is reviewing the plans, until June 11, 2021. To do this requires you to create a PRC account and follow their detailed instructions, including submitting a PDF files with your comments.

For more local context, here is a previous article on the USPS we published in the Cedar Mill News in June 2020. Unfortunately, there is no provision in either proposal that would create a Post Office in Cedar Mill, or make it easier to set up a new Contract Station.

City of Beaverton Council, **Position 1**

Ashley Hartmeier-Prigg won the majority (49.02%) of votes. She will progress to the September 21 runoff election. Jerome Sibayan, the second place runner-up, obtained 38.54% of votes, trailing behind total,13,534 Oregon voters participated in the City of Beaverton Council Position 1 election.

Portland Community College (PCC), Director Zone 4

Serin Bussell, Jim Harper, and Dimitry Sashchenko ran for this position in the May special election. A total of 5,046 votes were cast-Bussell won 3,168 votes, Harper won 1,551, and Sashchenko won 289 votes. The remaining 38 votes were cast for write-ins.

Dan Saltzman, the incumbent director for Zone 5, was the only candidate running for this position. Saltzman won 98.34% of the 12.961 votes.

Beaverton School District (BSD) Director, Zone 1

Susan Greenberg, incumbent, ran against challenger Jeanette Schade. Greenberg won 66.11% of the 41,343 votes cast; Schade took 33.66%

BSD Director, Zone 2

Karen Pérez-Da Silva won a 69.27% majority against Fuhua Xu (30.45%). 40,726 votes were cast for this position.

BSD Director, Zone 4

Sunita Garg, Darcie A. Batcheler, and Saralyn Dougall ran for BSD Director for Zone 4. Garg won 66.52% of votes, surpassing Dougall's 28.06% and Batcheler's 5.13%. 40,455 votes were cast in total.

BSD Director, Zone 5

Ugonna Enyinnaya challenged incumbent LeeAnn Larsen for the BSD's Zone 5 Director position. Enyinnaya managed to unseat

Larsen with a 60.79% majority of votes. Larsen obtained 38.51% of the total 39,269 votes.

Tualatin Valley Fire and Rescue (TVF&Ŕ) District **Director, Position 1**

Bob Wyfells ran unchallenged for this position and won 98.77% of the 45,767 votes.

TVF&R District Director, Position 2

Clark Balfour ran unchallenged for this position and won 98.94% of the 45,845 votes.

Gordon L. Hovies ran unchallenged for this position and won 98.90% of the 45,469 votes.

Bernice Bagnall ran unchallenged for this position and won 98.85% of the 19,461 votes.

Dick Schmidt ran unchallenged for this position and won 98.46% of the 18,268 votes.

Jim Duggan ran unchallenged for this position and won 98.86% of the 19,413 votes.

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


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
