





Washington County News **Chanaes ahead for** county leadership

Board of County Commissioners (BCC) Chair Kathryn Harrington has announced that she will not seek re-election next year when her term is finished. Current District 2 Commissioner Pam Treece has begun her campaign to replace Harrington as Chair. That would leave her position open.

There are four districts that each elect a Commissioner locally, and the Chair is elected county wide. There will likely be a primary in May 2026, and a runoff, if necessary, in November 2026.

Clean Water Services update

After facing scrutiny from the BCC and the public for lavish travel and meal expenditures, Diane Tanaguchi announced her resignation in May. Rick Shanley, chief engineer and water technology officer, was appointed to fill in as CEO while a national search is conducted for a permanent replacement. The five-member board of Washington County also serves as the board for CWS, the sewer and stormwater management agency for our area.

The agency had proposed a four percent rate increase for the 2025-2026 fiscal year. During the CWS Budget Committee meetings on May 9 and May 23, members of the Budget Committee and the public emphasized the importance of further discussion regarding the scope and timing of the proposed increase. The county Budget Committee approved a <u>\$2 billion total budget</u> for fiscal year 2025-26 during a public hearing on May 20. The county's budget is required by law to be balanced (expenditures equal revenue).

This is the fifth year in a row that Washington County has experienced a general fund gap between projected revenues and expenditures. Over that same five-year period, Washington County has experienced the most population growth among the three counties that comprise the Portland metropolitan area, an indicator of the community's growing demand for services.

The general fund is supported primarily by property taxes. Oregon's restricted framework for generating property taxes puts Washington County at a disadvantage relative to its regional peers.

Details of the budget process and the projected cuts are in this news release. The Board of County Commissioners will consider adopting the approved budget after a public hearing on June 17. Continued on page 4

Road News impact of different rate increases, Thompson realignment project detours

Wednesday, June 11-Friday, June 20, CWS will return all hours, between Anthem Lane and a public hearing **Circle A Drive** on June 17 when

Thompson will be closed for road construction and drivers will be detoured to Saltzman, Cornell, and Bethany Blvd. This will be similar to the previous closure last year (labeled Closure 1


on the detour map). The contractor will keep a sidewalk on at least one side of the road open for cyclists and pedestrians.

Later this summer, a five-week closure between Saltzman Road and 135th Terrace will be necessary for the contractor to complete construction, after which Thompson will reopen along the new alignment.

Intermittent lane closures will continue between 8:30 am and 2:30 pm at locations along the old alignment. More information about the project is on the project webpage.

Highway 217 weekend closures

Weekends of June 6 (southbound), June 20 (southbound), and June 27 (northbound), weather permitting, between Friday 9 pm and Monday 5 am, all ramps between Canyon Road and Highway 99W





All lanes and on- and off-ramps in one direction in the project area will close multiple weekends. Crews will pave the ramps, shoulders, and new auxiliary lanes over the weekend closures. The remaining lanes within the project area will be paved during nighttime lane closures.

Paving is dependent on weather and equipment availability, which means details may change suddenly. Please check the project website regularly for the most up-to-date information.

Temporary striping will be in place until the pavement cures and then the contractor will install final striping. The new auxiliary lanes may not open right awaycrews might still need to use them to finish work along the shoulders and side slopes.

Oregon DMV offers online collision reporting

Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) now offers an online option for the Oregon Traffic Collision and Insurance Report. Drivers involved in a collision can now complete and submit the report to DMV through DMV2U.oregon. gov. Get the details on the DMV Collision Report webpage.



Cedar Mill News June 2025 Helping young people thrive: The impact of Youth Villages

Since 2011, Youth Villages has been a driving force in the lives of more than 5,000 children, young adults, and families across Oregon. A nationally recognized nonprofit organization, Youth Villages brings innovative and effective mental and behavioral health services to youth and their families in Oregon. With locations in Portland, Bend, and Salem, Youth Villages Oregon offers teer support to our programs. Our a range of community-based pro-

grams designed to keep children safe, families together and young people on the path to independence.

In Washington County, the Intercept® program provides in-home support for children involved in child welfare or juvenile justice, helping reduce out-of-home

placements and encouraging family stability.

Youth Villages offers two programs to help young people who have experienced foster care become successful adults. Through LifeSetTM and the Independent Living Program (ILP), young people set and reach goals they need to navigate adulthood. In LifeSet, specialists meet face-toface with young people ages 17-22 at least once a week for nine to 12 months, providing guidance designed to help them navigate the transition to adulthood. Specialists help the young adults identify and accomplish their goals which might include housing, career preparation, money management, personal growth, and transportation. Young adults are eligible for ILP at age 14 and may remain in the program until their 24th birthday. Participants engage directly with an ILP specialist at least once a month, working on their goals and a long-term transition plan through caseworkers, foster parents, and others.

Youth Villages Oregon offers hope, healing and a fresh start for children and families who need it most. Their outcomes speak for themselves: one year after receiving services, the vast majority of participants are living at home or

independently, are in school or employed, and are staying out of legal trouble.

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Public trail immunity law made permanent

The 2025 Oregon Legislature has passed a bill that makes permanent the 2024 temporary changes to immunity for landowners who allow public use of land without charge for recreational purposes. We wrote about this in December 2023, as cities and park districts grappled with a decision about a trail in Newport. Fields v. City of Newport led the insurance industry to recommend that landowners/jurisdictions close all public trails. The legislature responded with a temporary law in 2024 providing immunity for recreational uses of property. That law is set to expire in January 2026 so the legislature has passed SB179, adding some specifics and making the immunity permanent. It currently awaits the governor's signature.



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 Business News, continued from page 2 financial statement is now available. It even has an official SSA logo and provides instructions for viewing your statement by downloading an attachment.

However, the email isn't actually from the SSA. Downloading the attachment installs software that lets cybercriminals access your computer. This software allows them to take full control of your device and steal your personal information, banking details, and private files. They can then use this information to steal your identity and commit financial fraud!

Follow these tips to avoid falling victim to a phishing scam: Never download attachments from unexpected emails. Remember that real government agencies typically communicate sensitive information through paper mail, not email. Check the sender's email address carefully. Scammers often use sender addresses that look similar to official ones but have small differences. While this scam targets users in the US, remember that cybercriminals can use similar tricks worldwide.

If you do not file a report, Oregon law requires DMV to issue a suspension notice.

To use the report in DMV2U, drivers must have an Oregon license, permit or ID number. Outof-state drivers will need to submit



the paper version (mail, fax or DMV field office).

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
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
