The Power of Produce Program (POP) is a nationwide program that began right here in Portland, with the goal of introducing kids to the fun of trying new foods, especially new fruits and vegetables. Each week, we go on market scavenger hunts, learn to "eat from the rain-

bow," and plant and watch things grow. Once the kids complete the project they are given \$2 tokens that they can use to buy whatever fruit or vegetable they want.

Working with the Adelante Mujeres Program helps new vendors who are in this program begin their own businesses. One of our favorite vendors, La Popular (awesome tamales), began as an Adelante Mujeres vendor. They now operate successfully on their own. Booth fees are waived for the first year for these special vendors to give them a solid boost. We have had a number of vendors come to us over the years and we value the partnership the market has with them. This year our new vendors to this program are Baja Snacks and El Goloso. Please make sure to visit them!

SNAP & the Double Up Food Bucks Program assists people who have SNAP cards to "double up" on their produce. If you have a SNAP card, just come to the information booth, we will run your SNAP card for the amount you would like to deduct, and then we match that amount (up to \$20 each week) with Double Up FoodBucks. It is a great way to help you get more fresh produce than you might otherwise get. Thank you, Farmers Market Fund! Our market



has \$5000 to support this program—please come out if you have SNAP benefits (or CASH benefits)!

CPO 1 September Meeting: Water update

Tuesday, September 12, 7 pm, hybrid <u>via zoom</u> and at Cedar Grove East Community Room, 13400 NW Cornell

After the Land Acknowledge ment and updates from our service providers, we'll share any development information we have received and provide time for announcements from CPO members.

At 7:45, we'll hear from Beaverton School District's (BSD) Clothes For Kids. The service is experiencing huge demand, so they have moved to a larger space to better serve students' needs. Learn about what the service provides, how to use it, and how to offer your support for it, especially how to register to volunteer for the BSD.

At 8 pm you can learn about Clean Water Services and Washington County's Onsite Septic Program from Brian Fogg, Housing Rehabilitation Specialist with Washington County. The new Onsite Septic Financial Aid program will help those with septic systems to repair, replace, maintain, or decommission their septic tank, and connect to the public sewer system. Applications are available via the Washington County website here:

Then we'll learn about the project to bring Willamette River Water to the Tualatin Valley. Construction has been underway since 2014 and the system is expected to be functional in early 2025. Existing water supply in the area is neither adequate for future needs nor is it resilient enough to survive an earthquake. Attend to learn the latest and learn more on the project website here.

The estimated \$1.6 billion cost of the program is shared among many sources. Learn more here. There will be time for questions after the presentation.

If we have new information in time for the meeting, we'll discuss the latest on the future of the systems. OEICE will give its Quarterly Update to the County Board of Commissioners on September 5. On October 5 they will present their latest proposal for the "re-envisioning" of the CPO and CCI programs.

what CPO means to us. We'd also welcome input from you, CPO 1 members! Take the survey when you can to help us preserve what you value from your CPO!



since the land was annexed into Beaverton several years ago.



Hidden Creek Park West was designed as an inclusive and accessible park and playground for people of all abilities. Park features include



inclusive play elements; stable surfacing areas; generously sized all-gender restrooms; six accessible parking spaces; and a 50-footlong friendly forest giant made of cedar. The name means "gold" in Spanish and alludes to the city's name of Hillsb"Oro". The park will also feature water play, looping pathways, exercise equipment, swinging benches, shade structures, a hammock grove, game areas, and a mural. In addition to the mature oaks and firs on site, more than 200 trees and native shrubs are being planted as part of the project.

The Beaverton School District (BSD) Clothes for Kids service has opened this year in a new larger and brighter space on the opposite (east) side of the BSD Auxiliary Facility complex, now with extended hours of service to meet the huge demand need assistance signing up to volunfor clothing.

Clothes for Kids is a district-run, volunteer-supported program that provides free clothing for students in grades K-12 in any of the district's 54 schools. Students and/ or parents can visit Clothes for Kids two times per school year to receive 10 articles of clothing per visit.

To schedule an appointment, parents may login to their ParentSquare or call 503-356-4322. Appointments are per family, not per student. During the 45-minute appointment, there's a limit of one adult with up to four children or two adults with 5 or more children.

Donations of clean, schoolappropriate, gently used, or new clothing and shoes are greatly appreciated. Ongoing crucial needs of the program:

- New underwear and socks for all ages and sizes
- Pants for elementary-aged students in sizes 5-12
- · Coats for elementary-aged students in sizes 5-12
- Department store shopping bags with handles

They let us know that they are particularly low on shoes for elementary students, sizes 11-4, and coats sizes 7 and up. We will collect items at the Cider Festival booth at the Cedar Mill Farmers Market on September 16 if you prefer.

Financial contributions are used to purchase new articles of clothing such as socks, underwear, and coats. Please make checks payable to Clothes for Kids and mail to the BSD Auxiliary Facility, 16550 SW Merlo Road, Beaverton, OR 97003. You also can donate online by going to the **Business Services webpage** and select "Donations." Then click "Donate Here." Use the pulldown menu on the right side and choose "Beaverton School District" and then select "Clothes for Kids Donation" under "Item."





Obituaries

When well-known Cedar Mill people pass on, we try to remember them here, but sometimes it takes a while to gather the information.

George Choban, July 13,1929-September 9, 2022

George grew up on his family's 37-acre farm on Barnes Road that stretched from near the present-day Si Señor Restaurant to the former Teufel property on Barnes Road to the southwest. They grew celery and later green beans.

George attended Willamette University where he majored in mathematics. He taught math in various schools and finished his teaching career at PCC Rock Creek. A feature on him was published in the school magazine in 2011. He retired at age 83!

He met his wife Anastasia, better known as Susie,

in San Francisco and they married 13 days later! They returned to the farm, and Anastasia began working for Oregon Health Sciences University, and then at the Primate Center. She continued to work as they raised their three girls.

He and Susie opened the family restaurant, Marika's, serving Greek and American food from 1970-1989. The building, now Si Señor, remains in the family after having been variously Santorini and The Grapevine. They were frequent diners at Si Señor Lois Elaine Findley Taylor, until just before his death.

Much of the original farmland is now the Cedar Mill Wetland on Barnes. In 1989 they bought a 22acre farm in the Rock Creek area. They started out in the old farmhouse but built their present home



in the early 70s. Two of their daughters live nearby on the property, and the other one lives in Salem.

The Chobans continued their involvement in the Cedar Mill community, regularly attending CPO 1 meetings through the early 2000s and driving one of George's classic restored autos as part of the opening celebration for the Cornell road work several years ago.

George is survived by Susy and his three daughters who still manage the restaurant building.

Sam Bosch, December 24, 1934 - July 29, 2023

Sam Bosch lived in Oak Hills and was an active member of the Oak Hills Community Church. He sponsored The January Series of lectures from his alma mater, Calvin College in Michigan, that was live-streamed to the church. He founded Peregrin Technologies, a Cedar Mill business that developed ATM and other point-of-



purchase and cash logistics products. From his online obituary, "He was a man who loved his work, his

family, and his God. He left this earth surrounded by the loving care of his devoted wife, children, and their families and the unwavering support of his Oak Hills Church family. Sam will be missed by his wife Corinne, his children Shelley, Jonathan, and Agata Jewstafiew, David and Jolynn, and Sara and Giovanni Bencomo as well as his grandchildren Pascal and Madeleine Matheis, Matylda Bosch, Carolina and Santi Bencomo."

November 30, 1933-June 11, 2023

Lois grew up on her parent's farm that originally stretched from Thompson to Laidlaw west of Saltzman. She attended the Union School and Beaverton High, and went on to get her Master's Degree from Oregon State. She taught Business at Beaverton High, retiring in 1962 to raise her family.

She and the family were longtime members of Bethany Baptist Church. She married fellow teacher Don Taylor, and after Don retired, they started Taylor's Blueberries on a portion of the family farm. Part of the farm was sold to Beaverton School District to become Findley School. She is buried, along with many members of the Findley family, at the Union Cemetery of Cedar Mill. "She was my favorite cousin," said Ken Findley, who noted they often played together when both were young. Read more in her Legacy obituary here.
