



Legislative changes

The November election results kicked off a game of musical chairs in terms of our local Oregon State representation. Elizabeth Steiner, who had been our State Senator, was elected to be State Treasurer and announced her resignation from the Oregon Senate. By law, the commissioners of the counties represented by a departing legislator get together to appoint someone to replace them for the duration of their term. That legislative appointment must be made from the same political party

County proposes changes to CPO program

In November, we introduced readers to the Community Participation Organization (CPO) Modernization program, a long-anticipated effort by Washington County administration to change many aspects of the CPO system. This month, we are sharing thoughts on one of the elements of the proposal: changes to the Focus and Scope of the future CPO program. Changes are also proposed for descriptive language, membership and how

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leaders are selected, geographic boundaries, and program requirements. Community members are encouraged to provide input about the recommendations by taking this online survey.

The "Updated Focus and Scope" element is described as: Restoring the original focus of the CPO/CCI program so that it advises the Board has highly constrained enrollment of County Commissioners primarily about land use and transportation planning within Washington County's unincorporated areas. The CPOs and CCI would continue to provide opportunities for community updates on other topics.

Missing from this guideline is

the original CPO program focus of providing civic education—how our county works-to all county residents. Designed by the OSU Extension Service, education was inherently a part of the CPO program. Now, civic education is provided only to a subset of residents as the county's Civic Leaders Program requirements.

There are two messages in this guideline: CPOs are primarily (solely?) to focus on the county's Land Use and Transportation (LUT) planning topics, and they are allowed to provide "community updates." For the 50-year duration

of the CPO program, LUT planning topics have not drawn wide-spread interaction from the community unless that planning was directly impacting a particular neighborhood. The Cedar Mill Town Center planning process of the early 2000's was well engaged because of the immediacy of the impact. Also, the county's Urban/Rural Reserves effort of the early 2010's was actively engaged by people directly affected but certainly not by the overall community. The LUT Planning Work Program, the LUT Transportation System Plan, state law mandated Middle Housing, and Continued on page 3



Cedar Mill Real Estate Market

It is cold in Portland! We are seeing downpours in the neighborhoods and snow on the mountain. The onset of winter brings a quiet real estate market typical of our

historical seasonal patterns. This season brings some unique twists. Buyer traffic has shown greater resilience compared to 2023, and the lower interest rates in September were a big part of that. Still, inventory remains higher than usual and buyer traffic is declining.

There are some benefits for both buyers and sellers. This year, the market has been a bit more active. Buyer traffic typically drops a little faster during this time, but this year has shown a more gradual decrease. Lower interest rates in September are likely the reason, though rates have popped back up recently. Even with the September rate reduction, current traffic is similar to that seen in 2023 and is expected to con-Market of Choice makes holiday tinue its typical decline, especially since interest rates have risen. The year isn't over, but we have a short amount of time left before the major holidays bring everything to a halt.

Inventory this year has remained higher than in 2023. However, I predict a continued lowering of inventory for the remainder of the year. Even though we have a little more buyer activity, we also have more inventory to sell through. As we approach December, slower buyer activity is expected, and the number of days on the market will continue to increase. Lower interest rates may come into play, but the backlog from summer will likely keep inventory high for this time of year.

As of November, 50% of listings have had price reductions. This time of year, for buyers, the price reductions and high inventory will bring more opportunities to negotiate. Next spring I expect buyer demand to dramatically increase (as it typically does) and that will likely be paired with low inventory. I expect next year's home prices to increase, bringing multiple offers due to upcoming lower interest rates and a buildup of demand.

Note new location. Because our two CPOs share interests and issues, we are combining forces again this month to present information to our members.

After community briefings from county service providers (Sheriff, Parks, Fire, etc) we'll learn more about the county's plan to change the Community Participation Organizations (CPOs) with a presentation from staff of the Washington County Office of Equity, Inclusion and Community Engagement that oversees the program. Labeled a Modernization Project, the plan includes changes to CPO boundaries, appointing leaders rather than having them elected, and several other critical changes. Read about the proposed changes, attend the meeting, and then take a survey to collect community feedback here.

Following that presentation, CPO 1 will hold its annual leadership election. The current slate of Virginia Bruce as Chair and Bruce Bartlett as Vice Chair/Secretary is running again. Nominations may be sent to cpolleaders@gmail.com.



CPO changes, continued from page 1 even the Significant Natural Resource work on the Community Development Code was engaged by an extremely small percentage (~0.05%) of community members. A primary emphasis on LUT planning does not seem destined to attract significant engagement from the residents.

The "community updates" referenced in this guideline are essentially the so-called "Qualityof-Life" issues which the CPO Modernization project seeks to minimize. However, these issues are more immediately important to residents than the long-range effects of LUT planning projects. These issues derive from the county's unique form of governance in which special service districts were formed to provide urban services. In CPO 1 in particular, there are fewer large planning efforts because most of the large parcels of land have already been developed.



Changes to CPO boundaries are also part of the proposed county plan.

The proposal seeks to discontinue CPO interaction with cities. The relationship of the CPO program to adjoining cities has been both cooperative and combative. For example, in 2005, Walmart proposed constructing a large store at Hwy 26 and Cedar Hills Blvd in the boundaries of CPO 1. To facilitate an easier application approval process, the land was annexed from the county into Beaverton. In spite of this, CPO 1 was recognized as an official group of record and was invited by the mayor of Beaverton to provide comments on the proposed development. Other recent CPO interactions with King City and North Plains have not been collaborative.

Clean Water Services (CWS) provides an illuminating, but complex, example. In 1970, a multitude of sewage treatment systems were consolidated into the Unified Sewerage


Agency (USA) in order to protect the Tualatin River. A healthy river is a public health quality-of-life issue. Its charter was expanded in 2001 to become CWS, which now serves the entire Tualatin River basin. In November 2024, CPOs 1 and 7 hosted a joint monthly meeting with CWS as the featured presenter focusing on local surface water drainage issues along with an overview of the organization. It was attended by a large audience who were very engaged in the discussion, primarily due to the drainage issues that affect their homes.

Approximately one third of the county's 600,000+ urban population lives in the county's Urban Unincorporated Area (UUA), not part of any city. New Urban Growth Boundary (UGB) expansions are guided by Urban Service Area agreements which mandate that the new urban areas must be administered by cities. However, for the

foreseeable future, the civic "community" in the UUA will be affected by a combination of the support administered by the county (e.g. the Enhanced Sheriff's Patrol District and the attempts to create Town Centers), the service districts, and notably the decisions that cities make. Since residents see the areas impacted by the decisions of these multiple jurisdictions as their communities, an effective CPO program should provide a means to interact with them all if the program is to facilitate Community Participation.


For a project of this dimension, a framework document would be extremely valuable to delineate the process and desired outcomes to inform the community of the scope of the project. The five guidelines do not provide residents with a comprehensive overview of why these changes are desirable. The Clackamas County Community Engagement Framework is a good example of a guiding document, placing their participation/CPO program in a larger context. If Washington County would provide a similar framework, comments from all community members would be better informed and more useful.

Legislative, continued from page 1 Senate District 17. That leaves our House District 34 (the Washington County communities of Bethany, Oak Hills, Cedar Mill, and parts of Beaverton and Hillsboro) without a representative.

The board must consider three to five candidates nominated by The Democratic Party of Washington County. We have heard that Sarah Beachy and Alexandria Goddard have applied for the nomination. There will be more candidates, but we were unable to determine who they are by press time. The board will likely make the selection during a special meeting in January.

Receive emergency alerts with Everbridge

Do you want to get direct public safety and emergency information? Have you previously received alerts through the CodeRed system? In 2021, Washington County transitioned to a new emergency alert system, Everbridge. Everbridge allows us to send targeted emergency information to communities, including notifications for wildfires, floods, and missing persons. It also gives us a direct line to let you know if your neighborhood has a public safety concern. When signing up, individuals can choose their preferred method for receiving time-sensitive information, such as via landline phone, cell phone, email, text message and more. Even if you had an account before on CodeRed, you'll need to sign up again to keep receiving alerts. Make sure to register today to stay informed at publicalerts. org/signup.

Cedar Mill Piano teacher's method reaches global students

What began in a Cedar Mill living room has evolved into a global movement that few could have predicted. When Joseph Hoffman started teaching piano to neighborhood kids to help pay for college, he noticed that traditional piano methods often left students feeling disconnected from the actual joy of making music.

"I wanted my students to love playing piano as much as I did," says Hoffman, who began developing a unique approach. Drawing from educational research and early childhood development theory, he created a comprehensive method built on the principle of "experi-



ence before explanation." His warm, engaging style has earned him the nickname "the Mr. Rogers of piano," resonating deeply with students and parents alike.

After establishing his piano academy in Cedar Mill in 2007, inspired by the remarkable progress of his in-person students, Hoffman began filming lessons in his living room and posting them online, hoping to share his innovative method with a broader audience. The response exceeded expectations: the videos captivated students far beyond Portland's suburbs. By 2016, the growing support enabled over 1,200 people to contribute to a Kickstarter campaign, raising more than \$318,000 to hire a team of designers and software engineers to develop a comprehensive online learning platform.

Today, Hoffman Academy reaches students in over 115 countries through HoffmanAcademy. com, and a YouTube channel with more than 240,000 subscribers. The core program—hundreds of high-quality video lessons, along with select printable materials and informative blog posts-remains free, embodying the motto "music education for everyone." The method weaves together multiple aspects of musicianship: students

learn to play by ear, understand and even compose their own pieces. Through a multi-sensory approach that engages natural curiosity and creativity, students begin making music from their very first lesson.

In his video lessons, Mr. Hoffman uses everything from finger puppets to games to make learning engaging, particularly for young students. For a low monthly or annual fee, premium members gain access to an array of additional learning

tools: play-along practice tracks help students master timing and rhythm, guided practice sessions keep them focused and motivated, and educational games like Mystery Melodies, Rhythm Shredder, and Staff Crawler reinforce musical concepts in playful ways. Premium membership also includes access to a comprehensive sheet music library and progress tracking tools.

Hoffman Academy has fostered a vibrant online community through its Parents & Students Facebook group, where families from across the world share performances, exchange tips, and build connections through their shared love of music. This virtual gather-



ing space helps bridge the distance between students from different countries and cultures, all learning through the same method.

The impact of this comprehensive approach reaches across continents. One international teacher who has worked in Korea, Japan, and Rwanda uses the method to bring piano education to communities where traditional lessons would be prohibitive. "I recommend Hoffman Academy to homeschool families and anyone who wants to learn piano but can't afford lessons," she reports.

While the online platform

continues to expand, the academy music theory, sight-read, improvise, maintains strong ties to Cedar Mill, with Mr. Hoffman teaching weekly group classes at the local studio. The in-person program thrives under teachers trained in the Hoffman Method. Furthermore, Hoffman Academy has fostered significant community partnerships, including collaborations with Be Wildly Kind, a nonprofit dedicated to spreading kindness throughout Portland.

> One of the most promising recent developments is a pilot pro-



gram with the Lang Lang International Music Foundation's "Keys of Inspiration" program, exploring how this Cedar Mill-developed approach can support group piano instruction in Title 1 schools. This partnership has the potential to bring piano education to students who might otherwise never have access to music lessons.

Hoffman also shares his teaching approaches at national music education conferences, metro area school districts, and through quarterly webinars attended by music teachers worldwide, helping to disseminate effective teaching methods beyond his direct reach.

Today, Hoffman Academy reaches far beyond its Cedar Mill origins, with new projects on the horizon. An online game called 'Sea Turtle Shuffle,' which helps students practice quickly identifying notes on the staff, is slated for release in the coming months, and students can look forward to a special digital advent calendar this December. What started as piano lessons in a local living room has grown into a program that brings music education to students worldwide.



This Holiday Season, Protect Your Packages

Don't let the Grinch take your holiday packages. The Washington County Sheriff's Office acts against package thieves in our community, but we can't do it without your help! Here are some tips to keep your packages safe and secure:

Track your packages: Use the tracking numbers provided and stay updated on the delivery status. Know when to expect your packages and plan to secure them promptly

Provide delivery instructions: Request packages to be placed in a secure location or ask delivery companies to require a signature before dropping them off

Opt for in-store pickup: When available, you can pick up your packages from a local store or delivery locker

Do not leave packages unattended: If you plan on being gone for an extended period, ask family, friends, or neighbors to pick up packages

Stay connected: Use text notifications to receive updates on your deliveries. Let your neighbors know if you had a package stolen so they can stay vigilant.

To report suspicious activity or if you are a victim of package theft, please call the non-emergency number at 503-629-0111. If you see a crime in progress, call 9-1-1. You can also file a police report online if here by December 6.

Growing Eyes: Protecting Children's Vision Health

Growing Eyes is a new local, optometrist-led nonprofit dedicated **Onset of Myopia** to raising awareness of myopia's impact on children's vision and eye health, and how we can slow its progression.

What is Myopia and How to Slow It

Myopia (or nearsightedness) is an increasingly common vision condition where distant objects appear blurry while close ones are clear. Myopia often starts in elementary school and tends to progress as the child grows, stabilizing in the late teens or early adulthood. Children with myopia may struggle to see the board in class and often avoid participating in school or sports, which can affect Helps



their learning and social interactions. Individuals often squint to try to see distant targets more clearly which can cause headaches and fatigue.

Over the years, eye care providers and researchers have noticed more children becoming myopic, often earlier in life than their parents. A recent study estimated that 41% of children in the US are myopic, almost doubling in three decades. The change is happening because our world is becoming increasingly digital and screen-driven.

Because of this, younger children's prescriptions often change more rapidly. Unfortunately, they will end up with a higher prescription as adults-increasing their risk for certain eye conditions and dependence on glasses or contacts.

Myopia is commonly corrected with glasses, contact lenses, or surgery (in adults). Fortunately, there are methods available to slow future prescription changes by half! Using specialized contact lenses or compounded eye drops, eye care providers can slow myopia's progression. Sadly, these treatments per year in a thrilling and rewardare often not well covered by vision insurance, leaving families burdened with the cost of their child's deteriorating vision.

How to Avoid the

There are simple ways to prevent becoming myopic! Research shows that spending at least two hours outside daily is the best way to prevent nearsightedness.

When indoors and using devices or reading a book, it is important to take routine breaks and hold reading material at a forearm's distance to reduce strain. It is best to limit a child's screen time, not exceeding two hours per day.

Regular eve exams can evaluate a child's risk for myopia and ensure their eyes are performing at their appropriate levels.

How Growing Eyes

Our goal is to provide families with tools to fully protect their children's vision. We do this by connecting families with eye care providers that offer full myopia management.

We also provide financial assistance to families in need of myopia management but unable to afford it. If you need help, please fill out our referral form on our website to request a financial assistance application.
